




### Demand for family doctors soars as availability declines

The demand for family doctors in the Calgary area and provincewide is soaring, with the <u>albertafindadoctor.ca</u> website reporting huge increases in visits over the past year as the number of physicians taking patients continues to decline.

The popular PCN online search tool, which aims to help patients find a family doctor, saw visits more than double from April 2021 to March 2022, compared to the previous year. A total of 716,163 visits during that period represented a 108 per cent increase on 2020-21, while the number of users increased 124 per cent to 490,764. Visits increased by more than 100 per cent in the south, Calgary, and central zones, while increasing by 92 per cent in the Edmonton area and 69 per cent in the north.

At the same time, the number of doctors taking patients fell provincewide from 731 in April 2021 to 390 by Thursday, May 5. The trend was mirrored in the Calgary area, where there were 323 doctors taking patients in April 2021, compared to 143 on Thursday, May 5. <u>Download the report</u>.



"The COVID-19 pandemic has demonstrated the importance of having a trusted health care provider and we are pleased that the Alberta Find a Doctor website has become such an important tool for Albertans," said Dr. Ernst Greyvenstein, Primary Care Network Physician Lead for the Calgary Zone. "At the same time, we recognize that it is becoming harder to find a family doctor and availability is limited in some areas. While many organizations are working together on the challenging issue of physician recruitment, nurse practitioners are being added to the website as another potential option for those in need of care."

The self-search tool available on <u>albertafindadoctor.ca</u> asks visitors to enter a location. Search results show both family doctors and nurse practitioners who are accepting new patients in that area.

## Paxlovid, Remdesivir eligibility expanded

The <u>eligibility criteria</u> for Paxlovid and Remdesivir has been expanded in response to emerging evidence related to the risk of severe outcomes.

Treatment will be offered to patients at the highest risk of developing severe COVID-19 illness resulting in hospitalization. Eligibility is summarized below. You can also <u>download the memo</u>.

\*Immunocompromised patients under the age of 18 should consult with their specialist. Transplant patients should not be offered Paxlovid.

Other Paxlovid updates are listed below:

- **Rebound symptoms:** In a small number of cases, patients have developed a relapse of COVID-19 symptoms within a few days of completing a course of treatment. This can be accompanied by a new positive test, after testing negative. It is not recommended that treatment is extended or repeated.
- Long COVID: Paxlovid should not be considered as a treatment option for patients experiencing symptoms of Long COVID.
- **Transplant patients:** These patients should not be given Paxlovid due to the potential for lifethreatening drug interactions. Transplant patients should be referred to the outpatient COVID-19 treatment program at 1-844-343-0971, or the patient's specialist.
- **Public messaging:** Albertans are now being told to talk to their family doctor about Paxlovid eligibility if they tested positive for COVID-19 and their symptoms began less than four days ago. If you or your clinic is not prescribing, patients should call 1-844-343-0971. Clinics are asked to fax prescriptions to pharmacies instead of asking patients to take them in.

## NAFLD pathway updated

One of the most downloaded pathways on <u>specialistlink.ca</u> has been updated. The Non-Alcoholic Fatty Liver Disease (NAFLD) pathway, which was originally developed in 2015, was recently updated by the Digestive Health Strategic Clinical Network. A Calgary Zone version of the pathway, which takes advantage of gold-standard shear wave elastography testing available in the Calgary Zone, has now been added to Specialist Link. <u>Download the pathway</u>.
