

Vascular surgery referrals

Vascular surgery joined the central access and intake program earlier this week, meaning all referrals now go through Facilitated Access to Specialized Treatment (FAST).

A new referral pathway explains the options available to providers:

- Non-urgent vascular surgery tele-advice is available via <u>specialistlink.ca</u>, from Monday to Friday, 8 a.m.-5 p.m.
- For non-urgent consultation, complete the <u>referral form</u>. Referrals are accepted via fax to 1-833-627-7023
- Urgent advice is available via RAAPID at 1-800-661-1700
- Emergencies should go to 911 or RAAPID, as appropriate

Measles case

Physicians are asked to report all suspected cases of measles following a lab-confirmed case in the Calgary area.

Cases should be reported to the medical officer of health on call prior to ordering testing, which can be arranged via this <u>information sheet</u>. Please use the lab tracking number 2023-El-1645 on all samples. Community physicians are advised to see patients with fever and rash at the end of the day, in a room with a door, to limit potential exposure. The measles vaccine is available.

Symptoms of measles include a fever of 38.3 C or higher, cough, coryza or conjunctivitis and generalized maculopapular rash. A red, blotchy rash appears three to seven days after symptom onset, beginning behind the ears and on the face, then spreading down to the trunk and lastly to the extremities.

Bronchiolitis: Less is best

Choosing Wisely Canada has produced a new "less is best" toolkit to help clinicians manage bronchiolitis in primary care.

Bronchiolitis is a viral infection that mostly affects infants and children under the age of two. Most children get better without the need for additional tests or treatment but more than half of children with bronchiolitis receive unnecessary tests or treatments such as antibiotics or chest X-rays.

Reminder: Stat testing standardization

A standardized community stat process and test list has been implemented at patient service centres and hospital outpatient collection sites throughout Alberta.

Tests should only be ordered as stat in urgent medical situations in which same-day results are expected to directly affect patient care. Consultation with lab medical staff is required for tests not on the provincial community stat test list. Review the <u>provincial community stat test list</u>.
