

Fall immunization program

The first phase of Alberta's fall immunization program got underway earlier this week with a focus on offering the COVID-19 vaccine free of charge to eligible Albertans.

Phase two, which begins Monday, October 20, includes influenza vaccination for Albertans aged five and older at community pharmacies. Appointments for children aged six months to four years old will be available at public health clinics.

The respiratory syncytial virus (RSV) vaccine will be available to those 60 years of age and older living in continuing care and seniors supportive living settings, as well as First Nations, Métis and Inuit individuals who are 60 years of age and older. All Albertans 70 years of age and older are eligible for the RSV vaccine.

Free COVID-19 vaccine eligibility in phase one includes:

- Healthcare workers (<u>more information</u>)
- Residents of continuing care homes and seniors supportive living accommodations
- Homebound home care clients
- Individuals six months of age and older with underlying medical or immunocompromising conditions
- Individuals experiencing homelessness
- Individuals 65 years of age and older receiving the Alberta Seniors Benefit

Immunization appointments can be made via <u>Connect Care</u>, by calling Health Link 811 or by contacting a <u>public health or community health centre</u>.

Regional network transition timelines

The Calgary area's new regional primary health care network is set to be launched by the summer of 2026, the Government of Alberta has announced.

The regional network, which will serve patients and provide support to medical homes in a geographical area similar to the current Calgary Zone, will be formed as part of an "evolution and expansion" of the area's seven Primary Care Networks.

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Calgary is due to be part of the second of three phases of regional network standup, with Southeast and Southwest Alberta scheduled to be formed in phase one in spring 2026. Calgary and Central are due to follow in late spring or early summer 2026, with Northeast, Northwest and Edmonton scheduled for late summer 2026.

The formal process of PCNs transitioning into regional networks is underway. The Ministry of Primary and Preventative Health Services, formerly known as Alberta Health, is leading the legal aspect of the transition. Primary Care Alberta is responsible for the operational implementation of regional networks, which includes creating implementation teams and an operating model.

Calgary is one of seven regional networks being established as part of the Modernizing Alberta's Primary Health Care System (MAPS) initiative, which aims to enhance access to comprehensive, team-based care across the province. More information.

Lab bulletin: Paper requisitions

Effective Tuesday, October 14, the only paper requisition accepted by Alberta Precision Laboratories for COVID-19, influenza and Respiratory Pathogen Panel (RPP) requests will be the COVID-19 and other respiratory viruses <u>requisition</u>. Primary care providers are reminded that community patients with symptoms qualify for routine COVID-19 and influenza testing.

Requests using other paper requisitions will be cancelled. Providers must check off the testing required. Written test requests will not be accepted. Providers should also complete the mandatory "Specify Test," "Clinical History" and "RPP Criteria" fields on the requisition, along with any other relevant clinical information. If any of these fields are not completed, testing may be delayed and/or cancelled. Read the bulletin.

Requisition printing: Effective Wednesday, October 1, automatic printing of Connect Care laboratory requisitions for blood and urine specimen orders has been disabled to improve workflows and reduce paper use. Patients are no longer required to have a printed form when visiting an Alberta Precision Laboratories site for blood or urine collection. More information.

Reminder: Stroke prevention clinic referral guidelines

Detailed <u>referral guidelines</u> are now available for Calgary's stroke prevention clinics.

Adults who have had a transient ischemic attack or a minor stroke can be referred to the clinics at Foothills Medical Centre and South Health Campus via central access at 403-944-1447 or via fax at 403-476-9635. The <u>updated guidelines</u> are also linked on the Specialist Link <u>neurology</u> access pathway.

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Please note that episodes of pre-syncope, loss of consciousness & memory loss, and recurrent episodes of dizziness are unlikely to be transient ischemic attacks. Consider referring these patients to the emergency department, Urgent Neurology Clinic (phone 403-944-2372) or General Neurology Clinic as appropriate. Retinal vein occlusion and anterior ischemic optic neuropathy may be appropriate for ophthalmology referral.
